




Ramona NJROTC Narrowly Defeats Trigger Time 4-H Shooting Education Club

November 3, 2024. In an exciting match this week, Trigger Time 4-H Club scored their highest yet in this year's National Sporter Air Rifle League. Unfortunately, they faced another loss this season, losing by just over 5 points to Ramona NJROTC 1130.4 to 1125.3. Of the top four athletes, three set personal records for the season: Rebecca Ahrens (291.8), Tanner Ridings (280.8) and Ayden Strand (272.6). Lexi Strand also contributed to the team season high with her score of 280.1. Trigger Time is now ranked 16th in the league and 3rd under Junior Rifle Clubs. For week seven, the club has a byeweek and will compete in their sixth and final match of the season on November 11th.

About the National Air Rifle League

The league is a national team league for high school teams and junior rifle clubs. The league has two parts. An 8 week regular season going on now, followed by the post-season.

The Champions Division is reserved for the top teams in the country. The top eight teams from the Champions Division regular season will compete in a single elimination tournament for the league championships.

In each game the teams compete in what is known as a Three-Position Air Rifle match. The match is modeled after Olympic Rifle competitions but adapted to high school age athletes. Each athlete will shoot 10 shots in three different shooting positions, kneeling, prone, and standing. Scored in decimal, each shot is worth a maximum of 10.9 points. The sum of points scored in the 30 shots is the athlete's total. The team score is comprised of the best four athletes from each team.

The National Air Rifle League is sponsored by Scopos. Scopos is the makers of the Orion Scoring System, the Athena Electronic Scoring Target System, and Rezults, the worlds first mobile friendly result website for shooting. Scopos is located in Manassas, VA.



Educator Opportunity: ADVANCE



The program An Experiential and Data-driven Approach to Agricultural Education (ADVANCE) is a face-to-face professional workforce development opportunity that provides educators with the knowledge, experience, curriculum resources, supplies/equipment, and mentoring to support the implementation of drones and precision agriculture concepts in the classroom. This is primarily a hands-on, field-based professional development program. After completing the ADVANCE program, participants will be FAA remote pilot certified, knowledgeable, and experienced in implementing a complete drone-based data collection workflow. In addition to receiving valuable knowledge and experience through the face-to-face workshop, educators will

receive a stipend, a mini-grant, free virtual training (in preparation for the remote pilot test), paid registration for the FAA's remote pilot certificate, & more!

Target Audience: Middle and high school teachers & 2-year college faculty teaching agriculture, forestry, environmental science, and related topics are encouraged to apply. Other educators will be considered (contingent on USDA funding provisions). Feel free to contact John McGee (jmcg@vt.edu) if you have questions or require clarification. NOVEMBER 4, 2024. The Prince William County Human Rights Commission recently stood up Cohort 9 of its Human Rights Student Leadership Council, marking a milestone with its largest group since the council's inception in 2015. With 67 high school students, the council aims to help sophomores, juniors and seniors from public high schools, private schools and home schools from across the county develop leadership skills and learn about county government through the lens of human rights.

During their time on the council, the students will learn about equity and inclusion, the U.S. Equal Opportunity Commission, the Fair Housing Act and the rights and responsibilities of the workplace. They will take part in guided discussions to learn differing perspectives and discuss how they would guide the community as the next generation of leaders; and they will present their hopes for the community's future to the Human Rights Commission.

Prince William County Executive Chris Shorter gave the keynote address to the new council members and an audience of their parents and friends that overflowed the Board of County Supervisors Chambers at the McCoart Government Center.

"You are already making a difference in the lives of people around you. You are already the hopes and dreams of your parents and your school administrators right now," said Shorter. "Thank you all for your interest. Thank you all for the journey that you are about to go on. A year with us in this program, learning about human rights and civil rights, is going to be meaningful to you, but it's meaningful to us. It is meaningful to the future of this county."

Guest speaker Dr. Charmelle Ackins, Chief Equity Officer for Prince William County Public Schools, emphasized the cohort's theme, "Lead and Learn: Emerging Leaders in Human Rights." Ackins commended the students for their dedication and highlighted the importance of their role as emerging leaders.

"Emerging leaders stand at the nexus of two groups – realized leaders and potential leaders. Realized leaders know how to use their powerful voice for better change," Ackins said. "Potential leaders have still yet to be discovered, encouraged and supported. As emerging leaders, you are discovering a voice, recognizing your potential and stepping into your leadership."

She called on the students to use their position to promote justice and dignity. "Know this. Every voice matters. Leadership is a choice. It belongs to anyone willing to stand up for the rights of others."

Prince William Human Rights Commission Chair Curtis Porter welcomed the students to what he described as an award-winning collaboration between the commission and Prince William County Public Schools. He underscored the commission's longstanding mission of eliminating discrimination and promoting equal opportunity in the county.

"The power of citizens and residents being engaged in county government is very important, and it was the citizens and residents of Prince William County in 1991 that filled this room and told the Board of County Supervisors, yes, we want a human rights commission with enforcement power in Prince William County," Porter said.
