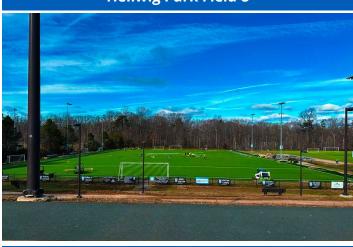

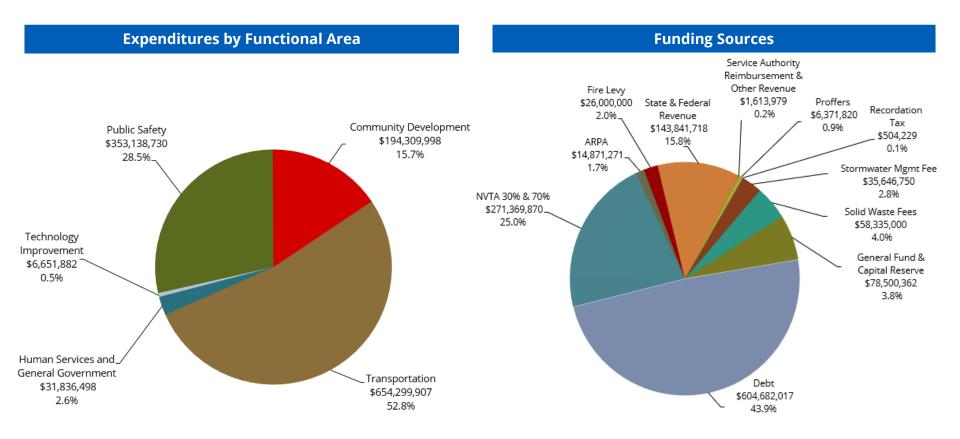

### Safe & Secure Community – Fire & Rescue System Existing Station Renovation Program



- FRS Station Renovation & Replacement Program addresses:
  - Large-scale station renovations
  - Rebuild existing, outdated stations
- Renovation projects:
  - Concrete repairs
  - Window replacement
  - Boiler/HVAC replacement
  - Shower/restroom renovations
  - Overhead door replacements
- PWCFRS programs specific projects
- \$4.0 million per year funded by fire levy
- Various upgrades and repairs underway or completed at 19 stations across the County

## Safe & Secure Community – Fire & Rescue Station 27



#### Project Cost: \$19.9M

- Spriggs Rd. & Route 234
- Design completed in FY24
- Land swap pending
- Construction summer 2025 (FY26)
- Occupancy January 2027 (FY27)
- Medic unit funded in FY25
- Engine unit programmed in FY27



## Fire & Rescue System - New Station Construction & Replacement

- New stations
- Rebuild existing, outdated stations

- Debt supported by the fire levy
- Designs begin every year-and-a-half
- Station 30 design appropriation in FY26: \$3.0M

## Safe & Secure Community – Public Safety Training Center



- Land acquired in 2018
- Master plan completed in 2019
- Project includes:
  - Classroom & support space
  - Apparatus bays
- Project cost: \$29.8M
  - Design completed in FY25
  - Construction scheduled to begin November 2025 (FY26)
  - Occupancy scheduled for March 2027 (FY27)
  - Facility operating begins FY27 (\$1.2M/year)

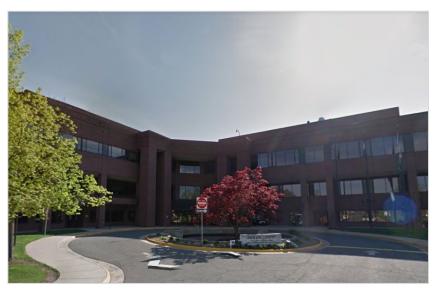




## Safe & Secure Community – Judicial Center Renovation



- Constructed 1983, courtroom addition 2004
- Address current facility renovations & upgrades
  - Elevator replacement
  - Fire alarm and sprinkler system
  - Exterior windows
  - HVAC systems
  - Space reconfigurations
  - Courtroom upgrades
  - Courts & Commonwealth's Attorney space renovation
- Project cost: \$33.1M
  - FY23 (capital reserve): \$10.0M
  - FY24 (capital reserve, ARPA, FY23 surplus): \$19.3M
  - FY26 (capital reserve): \$3.8M

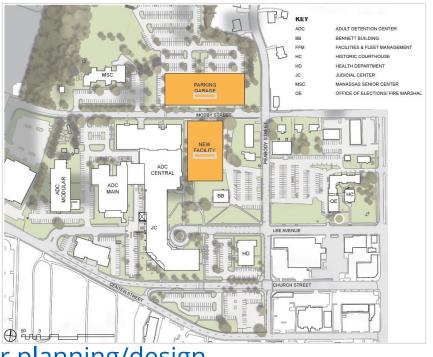


## Safe & Secure Community – Judicial Center Expansion



- Address long-term space
- Phased approach for parking and courtroom expansion
- Total project cost: \$200M
  - New parking structure
  - New courts building
  - Current appropriation: \$16.3M for planning/design
  - FY26 appropriation (parking garage construction): \$35.0M

	Parking Structure	Courtroom Building
Design completion	October 2025 (FY26)	July 2026 (FY27)
Construction completion	November 2027 (FY28)	May 2029 (FY29)



## Health, Wellbeing & Environmental Sustainability PRINCE WILLIAM Homeless Navigation Center – East

- 34,400 square-foot facility on existing drop-in center site
- Coordinated wrap around homeless services with community partners
- Continued homeless services at Ferlazzo Building until constructed
- Project cost: \$26.3M
  - Design completed in FY24
  - Construction begins April 2025 (FY25)
  - Occupancy January 2027 (FY27)



## Health, Wellbeing & Environmental Sustainability Homeless Navigation Center – West



- 2020 Board directive
- New facility constructed in western PWC
- Homeless navigation facility with wraparound services
- Project cost to be determined
  - Project will be debt financed
  - FY26 appropriation (design): \$4.0M
  - Construction cost and schedule will be determined as the preliminary design progresses and project scope is developed

## Juvenile Services Center & Woodbridge Library and Senior Center



#### <u>Juvenile Services Center</u>

- Moratorium on state reimbursements
- 2024 Juvenile Detention Center (JDC)
   Efficiency Study Report recommendation
  - Close PWC JDC
  - Consolidate to Fairfax



- Debt service remains programmed to support \$30.0M project
- Staff recommendation assuming no state reimbursement

#### Woodbridge Library and Senior Center

- Land acquisition ongoing
- \$4.0M in debt financing appropriated in FY25
- Debt service supported by the general fund

  - Recurring cash funding for existing park improvements

### Maintain community assets

- HVAC & boiler replacement

- Accessibility improvements
- Pool filters, gelcoats, repairs
- Trail bridge replacement

### FY26-31: \$5.2M each year

- General fund
- \$1.2M increase in FY25 for Parks
   & Recreation sustained







### **Government Operations, Performance & Innovation – Countywide Space**



- New PWC facilities on County-owned land
- Centralize existing leased space
  - Currently lease 457,400 square feet at approximately \$9.5M/year
  - Warehouse space and flex/office space
- Accommodate future space needs
  - New government center
  - Public safety space
- Master plan completion in 2025
- Future County facilities identified from master plan

### Government Operations, Performance & Innovation – Real Estate Assessments Computer-Assisted Mass Appraisal System



- Real estate assessments computer-assisted mass appraisal (CAMA) system supports the evaluation and appraisal of real estate
- Current system outdated, technologically-limited, and lacks modern features such as mobility and cloud support

### Project cost: \$3.6M

- FY26 appropriation (capital reserve)
- Vendor selection and contract award in FY26
- Design and implementation in FY27
- Go-live scheduled for August 2027 (FY28)

- NVTA 30% local
- Potential future commercial & industrial tax
- Grantor's tax **unavailable** (OmniRide local subsidy)
- Transient occupancy tax <u>unavailable</u> (OmniRide local subsidy)
- Reduce need to issue debt
  - Federal/state capital grants
  - NVTA 30% to cash fund mobility projects
  - Grantor's tax fund balance
  - Consider implementing commercial & industrial tax

# Capital Project Budget vs. Operating Budget



- Capital project budgets pay for:
  - Land/right-of-way
  - Design/architect
  - Information technology infrastructure
  - Construction
- Annual operating budget pays for:
  - Debt service costs for projects financed by debt
  - Facility operating costs
    - Utilities
    - Maintenance
  - Program operating costs the services operating from the facility
