<u>Check In</u>

- Wade discussed the noise testing performed on 04.08.2025. Testing was conducted at multiple locations; however, there was an error in the data collection, so only one site was recorded.
 - Wade will work with Dale to identify the testing locations in Great Oak for the three sites and three days of testing.
 - o Dale stated a resident agreed to have one of the meters on their property.
 - Agreed that all noise testing will be done outside of the property; due to the privacy of the residents, no meters will be set up inside the homes.
- Kathy would like to map out the draft Noise Ordinance adoption schedule to highlight the steps required to get the item to the Board on July 8.
- Tony- Planning is working with Moseley on the scope of work for the zoning.
- Bill agrees with Kathy about the need for a timeline.

Noise ordinance update – Wade Hugh

- Chair Jefferson gave a directive at the April 9 Board meeting to bring back a budget item (\$32K) for the Board's consideration on April 22.

Dale's Presentation(see attachment)

- Discussions about impulsive and continuous noise
 - The residents interpret the continuous noise all day with very low noise frequency.
- 30 days of continuous testing is beneficial to prove the amount of noise being measured.
- Discussed the benefits of resident perception to collect data within the Great Oak Community
 - Discussed having QR codes for a quick survey with simple questions to collect data from the residents
 - \circ $\,$ The location of the readings will also be key for data collection

- A time stamp will be on the surveys, so we can link back to the noise testing.
- Dale- The real objective of the noise ordinance is to make quiet data centers. If the data center industry know the levels in advance, they will aim to build a quieter data center. This can be done, as Cloud HQ is a prime example. The message would be if you want to build in PWC, you will need to conform to the noise standards.
- Kevin- The variety of things that cost money Amazon seems to make their buildings as cheap as possible.
 - There are many things that can be done with the design and layout of the building.
 - A development team should be formed within the county that would create standards for the data centers that have not been built yet, only been approved.
